- Founded in 1992
- Offices in Amsterdam and Dubai
- More than 16,000 members



What We Do



- Serve as Regional Internet Registry (RIR) for Europe, the Middle East and parts of Central Asia
- Secretariat for the RIPE community
- Manage K-root, one of the 13 Internet root name servers
- Training courses, capacity building and support
- Measurement and analytical tools (RIPE Atlas, RIPEstat, Routing Information Service)

Regional Internet Registry?



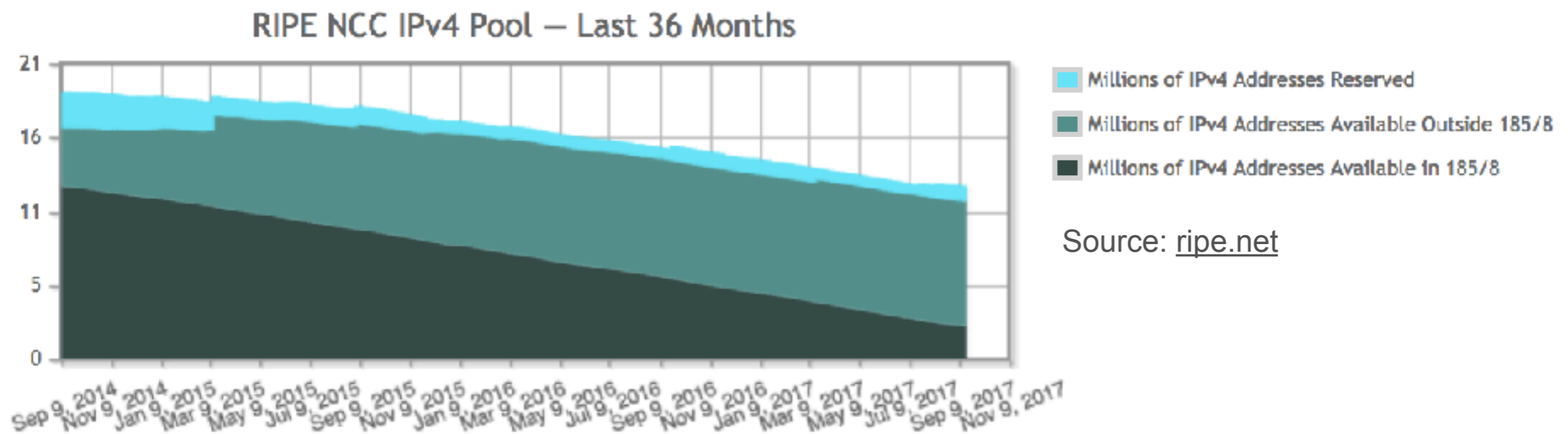
- There are five RIRs
- RIRs distribute and register Internet number resources



- Distribute IPv4, IPv6 addresses and AS Numbers
- Maintain the RIPE Registry and public RIPE Database



-
- On 14 September 2012, the RIPE NCC began to allocate IPv4 address space from the last /8 of IPv4 address space it holds
- Each RIPE NCC member can request a one time /22 allocation (1,024 IPv4 addresses)



IPv4: Current Situation

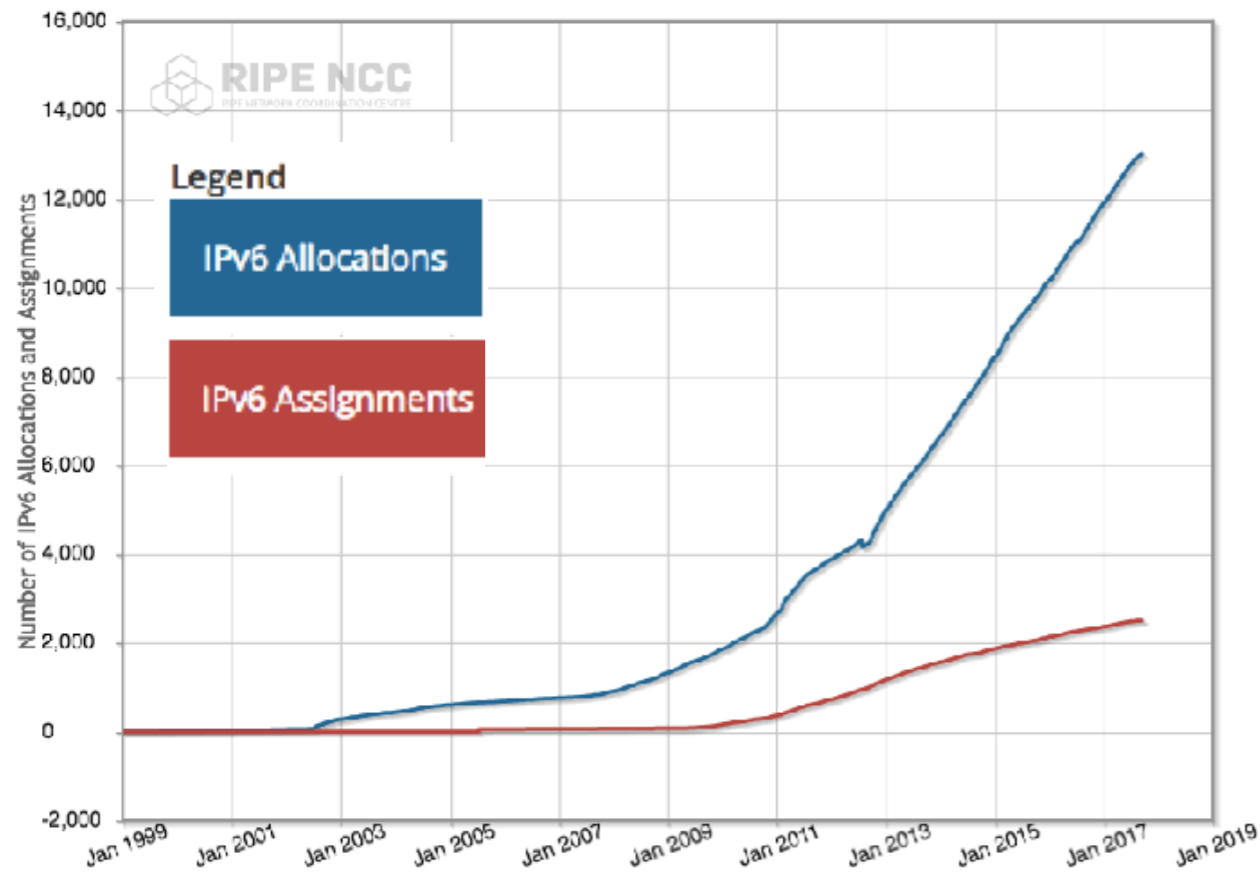


- On current predictions, 3-4 years of IPv4 (under current policy)
- An active market has emerged in IPv4 transfers

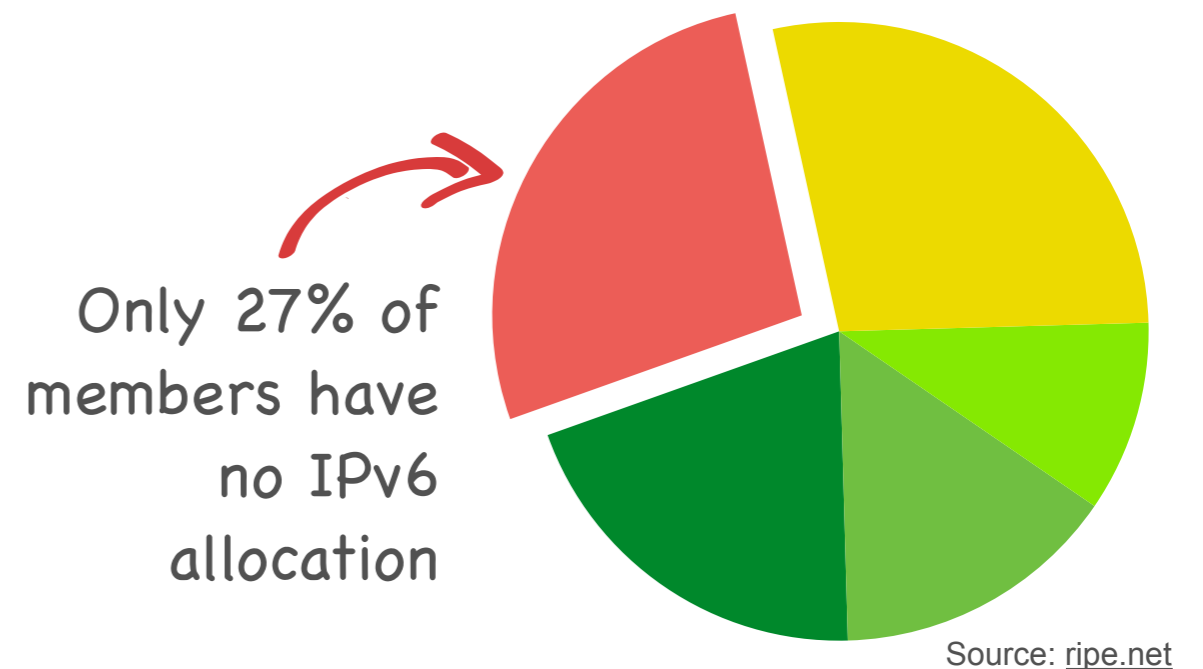
Accurate registration in the RIPE Database of addresses is the priority!



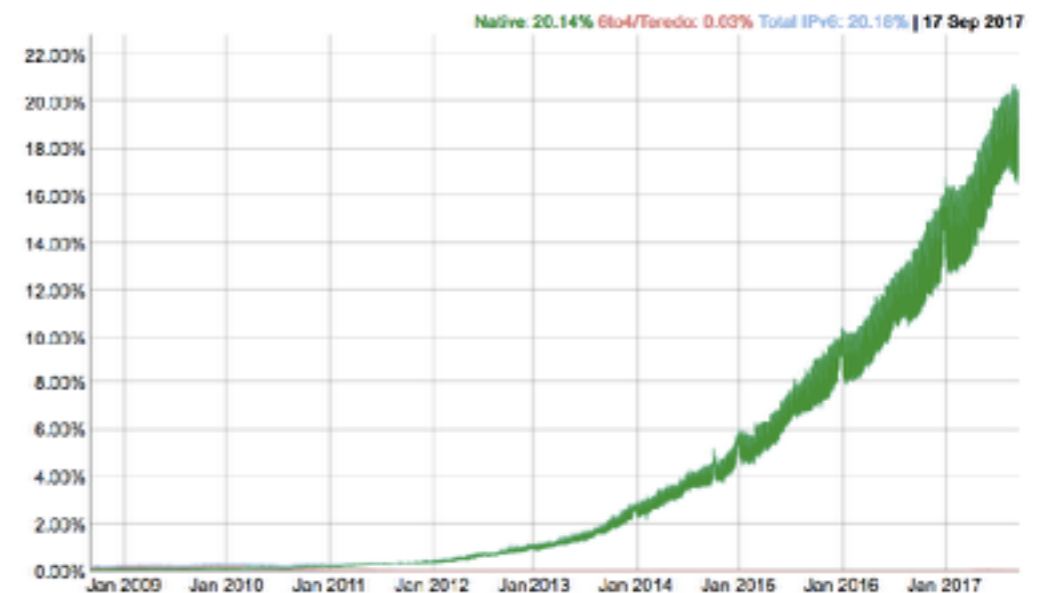
And IPv6?



- Strong distribution of IPv6 to RIPE NCC members



- Global IPv6 traffic rates are climbing
 - At around 20% globally, but big variance at country level



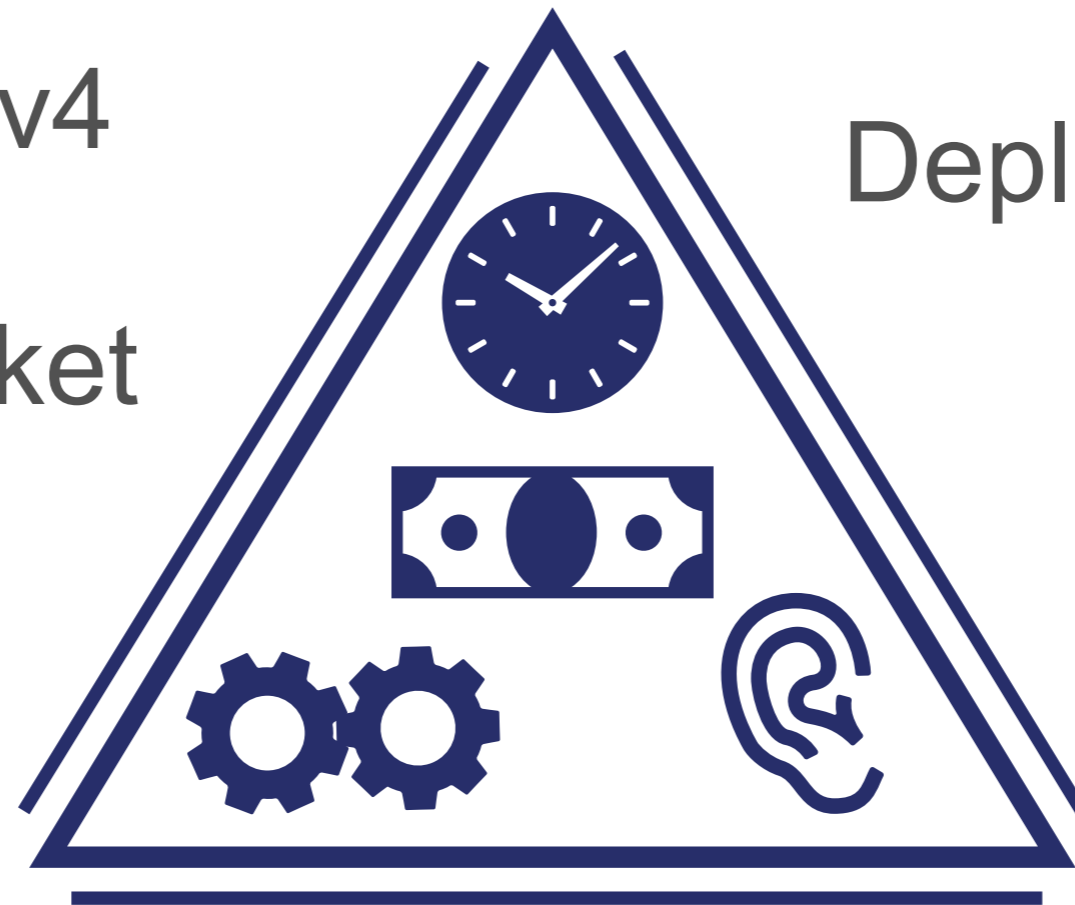

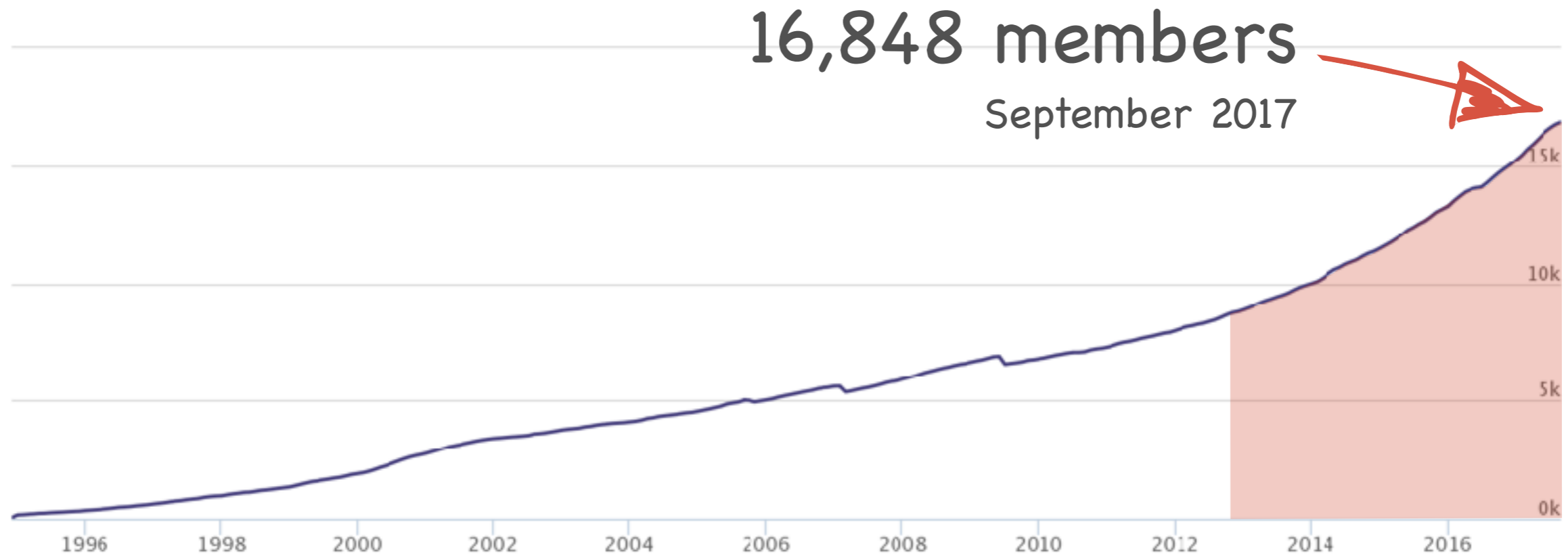

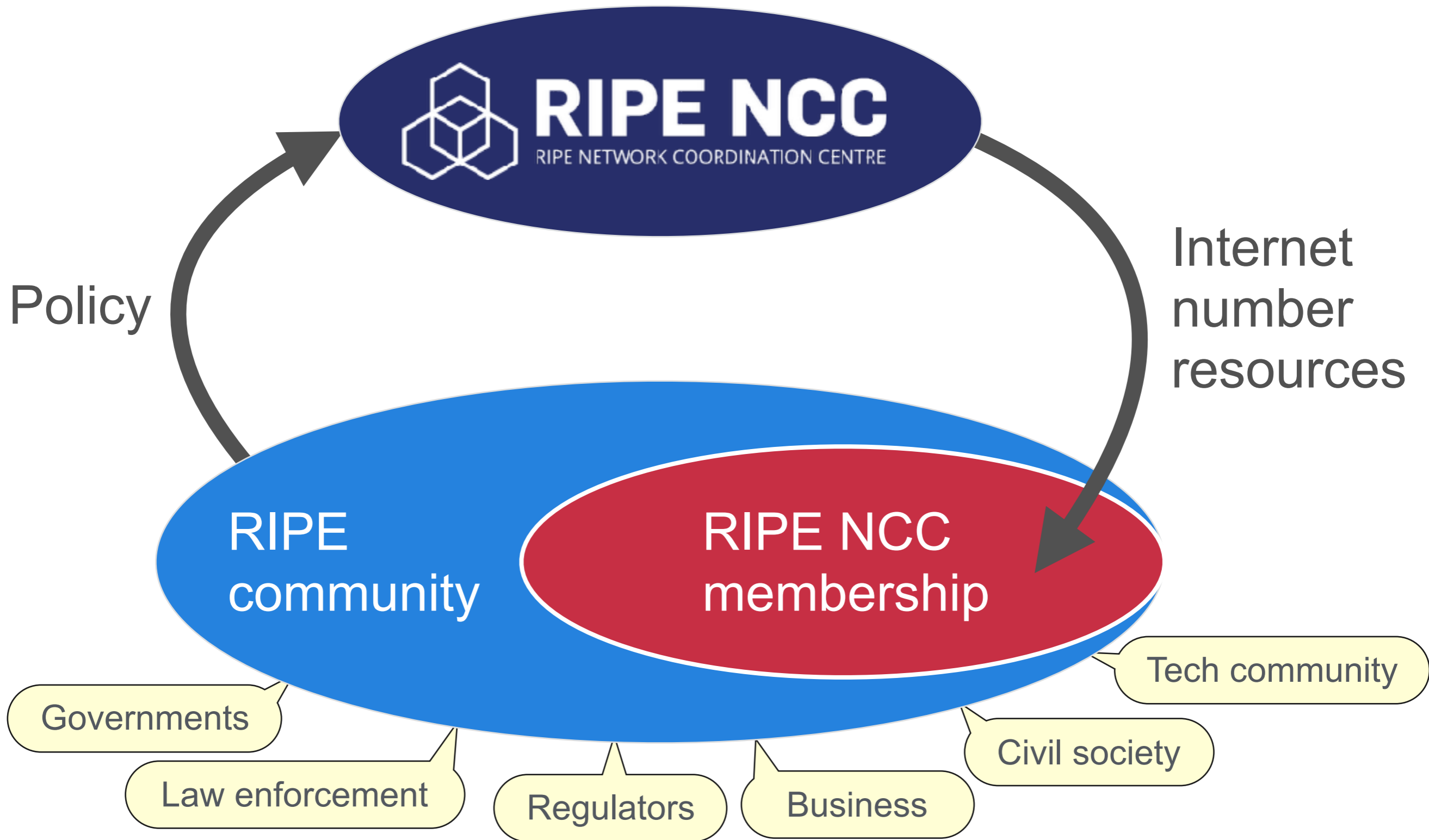
- Growing Internet industry

RIPE Policy Development



- **RIPE NCC does not make policy!**
- RIPE Policies are developed through an open, transparent, bottom-up process
- Anyone can get involved in policy discussions and proposals
 - Discussions take place on the relevant RIPE Working Group mailing lists
 - ...but not much participation from Arab country stakeholders
 - Monthly PDP updates are sent out by the RIPE NCC in Arabic

Governments and RIPE Policy



- Government policy
 - National regulation can affect the RIPE NCC and our members
 - Exchanging information can lead to better public policy
- RIPE policy
 - Governments and regulators are part of the RIPE community
 - ➔ And have their own interests in RIPE policy development

- Few government staff have background in RIPE
- How to address this:
 - RIPE Cooperation Working Group
 - RIPE NCC outreach to governments, law enforcement, regulators
 - Capacity building about RIPE and the Policy Development Process
 - MoUs
