UPDATE FROM THE RIPE NCC MANAGING DIRECTOR

The Member Update is an opportunity for us to inform our members about what's been going on at the RIPE NCC with regard to its activities and the services it provides for its members. With this edition, we'd like to change the focus to highlight what will take place at next week's RIPE NCC General Meeting (GM), which is where the membership can voice its opinion on the performance of the RIPE NCC and its Executive Board as well as vote on important resolutions and in Executive Board elections. We'll also highlight some of the things taking place at RIPE 68 that should be of particular interest to members.

The GM takes place twice a year and is an integral part of how the RIPE NCC operates as a membership association. The association comprises over 10,000 members, and these members have the responsibility to approve or reject a number of resolutions that directly impact how the RIPE NCC operates. At next week's GM, members will vote on five resolutions relating to matters such as the RIPE NCC Financial Report 2013, the RIPE NCC Charging Scheme 2015 and the implementation plan for the RIPE policy "RIPE NCC Services to Legacy Internet Resource Holders".

All of these items have sparked discussion in recent weeks, which is great to see considering they relate to the fees members will pay next year and also how the RIPE NCC will go about providing services for legacy resource holders. These things have very real effects on the day-to-day activities of our members, so we hope you take the opportunity the GM provides to let us know what you think and to cast your vote on the issues before you.

The May GM also includes the election of RIPE NCC Executive Board members. The Executive Board is responsible for representing the interests of the membership and for steering the course of the RIPE NCC. The candidates the membership elects next week will sit on the board for three years and will play a crucial role in directing the activities of the RIPE NCC on your behalf.

Last year, the membership approved a simplification of the voting registration process and an expansion of the Executive Board from five board members to six this year and seven next year. We also published a document that clearly defines the roles and responsibilities of Executive Board members. And now, for the election, we have six excellent candidates from six different countries in our service region. We are delighted that the choice of candidates before members offers such diversity in terms of geographic and industry backgrounds, skill sets and genders.

At the time of writing, well over 750 members from 60 countries have registered to vote, either physically at the meeting or remotely through electronic voting, and we expect many more to register in the coming days. The voting at the GM is when members make important choices and see the results of those choices a day later. This is democracy in action, and as with all democracies, we hope to see as many voters as possible take part in the process.

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The GM – Where Members Actively Direct the RIPE NCC

At the first RIPE NCC Executive Board meeting of the year, the board and the RIPE NCC's Senior Management Team discuss the agenda for the May General Meeting (GM). Many of the agenda items and resolutions are requirements under the RIPE NCC's Articles of Association, while others offer members the chance to discuss operational and financial matters relating to the RIPE NCC. Below, we look at the agenda for the upcoming GM and explain why these items are up for discussion.

1. Welcome, Preliminaries

The Chairman of the RIPE NCC Executive Board, Nigel Titley, will conduct proceedings at the GM.

2. Report from the RIPE NCC

The report from the RIPE NCC comprises a number of presentations given by RIPE NCC staff in the RIPE NCC Services Working Group, which takes place from 16:00 UTC +2 immediately before the GM on 14 May. Only RIPE NCC members can attend the GM itself, while the RIPE NCC reports are of interest to the wider community. For this reason, the report is presented at the working group session before the GM. These presentations include:

3. Presentation of the RIPE NCC Financial Report 2013

The Chief Financial Officer of the RIPE NCC, Jochem de Ruig, will present the Financial Report 2013. This independently audited report includes the following:

4. Adoption of the Audited RIPE NCC Financial Report 2013

Members will be asked to vote on a resolution to adopt the Financial Report 2013.

5. Discharge of the Executive Board

This agenda item asks the membership to discharge the RIPE NCC Executive Board from liability with regard to its actions as they appear in the Annual Report. In simple terms, this means that the membership waives the right to bring an action for liability against the individual board members for the period covered. It also generally means that the membership approves of the administration and its results.

6. RIPE NCC Services to Legacy Internet Resource Holders Implementation

Under this agenda item, the membership will discuss the RIPE NCC's proposed implementation of the RIPE Policy "RIPE NCC Services to Legacy Internet Resource Holders". This policy establishes the

principles to be applied by the RIPE community in offering and implementing registry services for legacy Internet resource holders. Members will be asked to vote on a resolution regarding the RIPE NCC's proposed plan for implementing this policy. The proposed plan is available at:

Members will also be asked to vote on a new RIPE NCC Conflict Arbitration Procedure, which would need to be amended to cater for situations involving legacy resource holders. The proposed procedure is available at:

7. RIPE NCC Charging Scheme 2015

Every year, the membership votes on the charging scheme for the following year, including the fees that members will pay. The Charging Scheme 2015, apart from outlining the standard membership fee, includes the proposed fees for the various options legacy Internet resource holders can avail of registration services from the RIPE NCC. 8. Report from the Executive Board

At this point in the agenda, there will be a brief presentation on the voting procedures before members cast their votes on five resolutions and in the Executive Board election. Members in attendance who choose to vote by paper ballot will be asked to submit their votes immediately, while those voting electronically will be able to vote until 14:00 UTC +2 on Thursday 15 May. RIPE NCC Executive Board Election

At the General Meeting (GM) in October 2013, the membership approved amendments to the RIPE NCC Articles of Association that allow for an expansion of the Executive Board, to six members in 2014 and then to seven members in 2015.

The current board felt that an expanded board would:

- Better reflect the changing composition of the RIPE NCC membership
- · Provide the board with more specialised knowledge
- Better handle the increased responsibility of the board in representing a growing membership with more diverse concerns and issues

This expansion means that three seats need to be filled at the GM next week. The seats of two sitting board members are up for renewal, and the expansion of the board means that a third seat is available. This already guarantees that there will be at least one and potentially as many as three new faces on the Executive Board by the evening of 15 May.

In order to attract an excellent set of candidates, the board developed a Roles and Responsibilities of Executive Board Members document that outlines the work involved in being a board member and board members' responsibilities in representing the membership.

The upshot of all this is that six candidates who reflect the increasing diversity of the membership have been nominated for election. The candidates, their biographies and their motivations for standing for election are available from the GM webpages:

Participating in **GM** Discussions

The General Meeting (GM) is one of the Executive Board's and the RIPE NCC's chief mechanisms for receiving feedback from the membership. By participating in the discussions at the GM and voting on resolutions, you are contributing to the board's planning for the year ahead. Work on the RIPE NCC Activity Plan will begin after the GM, and the feedback received by members at this meeting will greatly influence that plan.

Attending the GM

If you are a member of the RIPE NCC and will be in Warsaw on 14 May, you can register now to attend the GM by filling out the registration form at:

On the day of the meeting, the GM Registration Desk will be open, and you should go here to pick up your badge and your voting slips. When registering, you can also choose if you would like a meeting pack containing print outs of the documents to be discussed at the meeting, or you can choose not to receive one and read the materials online.

We ask that you go to the GM Registration Desk as early as possible on Wednesday to avoid large queues and delays later in the day.

Participating Remotely

The GM is broadcast live for all RIPE NCC members to follow online, and a chat facility is provided to allow all members to join in the discussions

The webcast will be available from 18:00 UTC +2 and members will be emailed the password to join the chat room. Electronic voting for the resolutions and Executive Board election will only become active from Agenda point 10 in the meeting, so you will need to follow the webcast to know when the voting window is open.

Voting at the GM

Voting at the RIPE NCC General Meeting involves the same basic three steps that take place in any voting process. Members register to vote, they collect their voting slip and then they cast their vote.

For those voting with paper ballots and those voting electronically, the way the voting slip is filled in differs only in the way the boxes are checked – with a pen or with a click of a mouse. The only real differences are how members register and collect their voting slips, and the timeframe in which they can cast their votes.

Voting by Paper Ballot

Only those members attending the GM in Warsaw can vote with paper ballots.

When members register to attend the meeting, they can add their name as it appears in the LIR Portal and the RegID for the organisation they wish to vote on behalf of. The vote will be assigned to that member if a colleague has not already taken the

To collect their voting slip after they register, members need to come to the GM Registration Desk at the meeting venue before 16:00 UTC+2 on 14 May. RIPE NCC staff will give a GM badge, a meeting pack and voting slips to the members.

At Agenda point 10 in the GM, the Executive Board Chairman will declare voting open and members can hand their paper ballots to the designated collectors in the room. Paper ballots must be handed in at this point. The paper votes are added to the online voting system when the electronic voting window closes.


Voting Electronically

All members who are entitled to vote have been emailed invitations to register for electronic voting. The final reminder to register was emailed to members on 8 May - please check that you have received this mail if you think you are entitled to vote. If you have not received the invitation, please email agm@ripe.net.

Once they receive this email, members just have to click the link in the email and select the RegIDs for the organisations they will vote on behalf of. The process takes less than a minute to complete.

All members who register to vote electronically will receive another email on the day of the GM with a link to the online ballots.

The voting period for electronic voters will remain open until 14:00 UTC +2 on Thursday, 15 May. You can watch the webcast of the GM to see when the voting window opens at Agenda point 10.



Counting the Votes – Resolutions

For resolutions, members can choose from three options: Yes, No and Abstain. For a resolution to be approved, more than 50% of the Yes and No votes cast must be Yes votes. The Abstain votes are noted but they are disregarded for the purposes of the vote counted.

To make sure your vote in valid, please mark a tick or cross in one box only.

Paper ballots are added to the electronic vote and the system calculates the result.



Counting the Votes – Executive Board Election

The Executive Board election works differently from the resolutions, as the Instant Run-Off Voting (IRV) system is used to elect candidates. With IRV, members must rank the candidates in order of preference from 1 (most preferred) to 6 (least preferred).

A candidate needs more than 50% of the votes to be elected. If no candidate has an absolute majority after the first round of voting, the least popular candidate is eliminated from that round of voting and their votes are redistributed. All the eliminated candidate's second preference votes are distributed to the remaining five candidates. If there is still no majority, the least popular candidate is again eliminated and their votes redistributed. This process goes on until one candidate receives more than 50% of the vote.

For the second seat, the same ballots are used. The winner of the first seat is eliminated from the process and the system again calculates how many first preference votes each candidate receives. The third seat is filled in the same way, with the winner of the first and second seats eliminated from the count.

With the IRV system, all three rounds are carried out using just one ballot. Again, the paper ballots and electronic votes are combined and the system calculates the result.

Announcing the Results

At the afternoon coffee break at RIPE 68 on Thursday, 15 May, the RIPE NCC Executive Board Chairman will announce the results of the voting on resolutions and the results of the Executive Board election.

Anyone in attendance at the RIPE 68 Meeting can attend the results announcement, and it will also be webcast for those participating remotely.
